## The Objects of the Bazaar.

**S**T. PETER'S MANEY is a daughter-parish of Sutton Coldfield, and is about 13 years old. It is ill-endowed and ill-equipped, but active and vigorous. The Church is partially built, and there is now a Vicarage. These have cost about £10,000, and are free of debt.

The development of Parochial life and work is hampered seriously for want of suitable accommodation. Over £1,000 was raised for this purpose in 1911, but the War has changed all values and such a sum became utterly inadequate.

In January 1919, the field adjoining the Church and Vicarage was on Sale by Auction. It was so obviously the best possible site for Parochial Buildings, that the Church Council secured it at £2,000. Mrs. Cooper, a former resident who now lives at Penmaenmawr, offered to pay half of this sum in order to acquire sites on the property for four "Cottage Homes" which she desired to build and endow in memory of her late husband, Mr. Cooper. With this new hope and the possession of "Ye Olde Stone House" (one of the historic Vesey Houses) on the site the picture of the little "beauty spot" began to unfold itself. Its final shape will be seen in the illustration on page 9. Few Churches in our land will be able to boast of a finer approach than St. Peter's when this scheme is a reality.

The Avenue was planted by individual donors of trees on November 15th, when also a temporary room was opened to meet the urgent needs of the moment.

The permanent buildings (see plan page 11) are designed to provide for all kinds of parochial, social and recreative needs in the locality, which is astonishingly deficient in this respect.

The total cost at present prices (excluding the Memorial Homes) will be about £14,000, but the plans are designed so that at very little extra expense, the buildings can be completed, section by section, as funds permit.

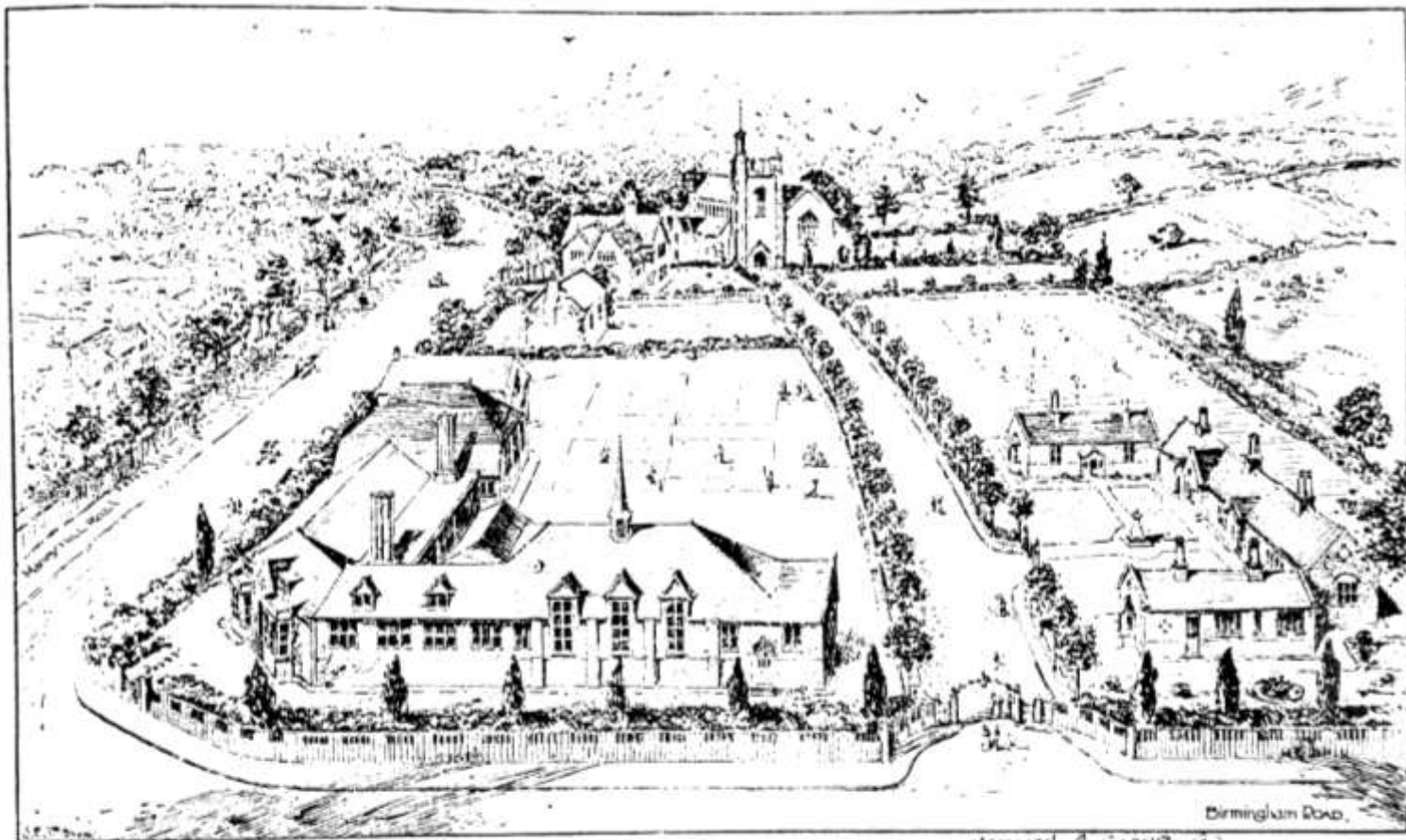

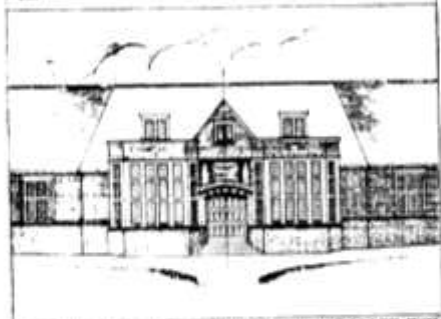

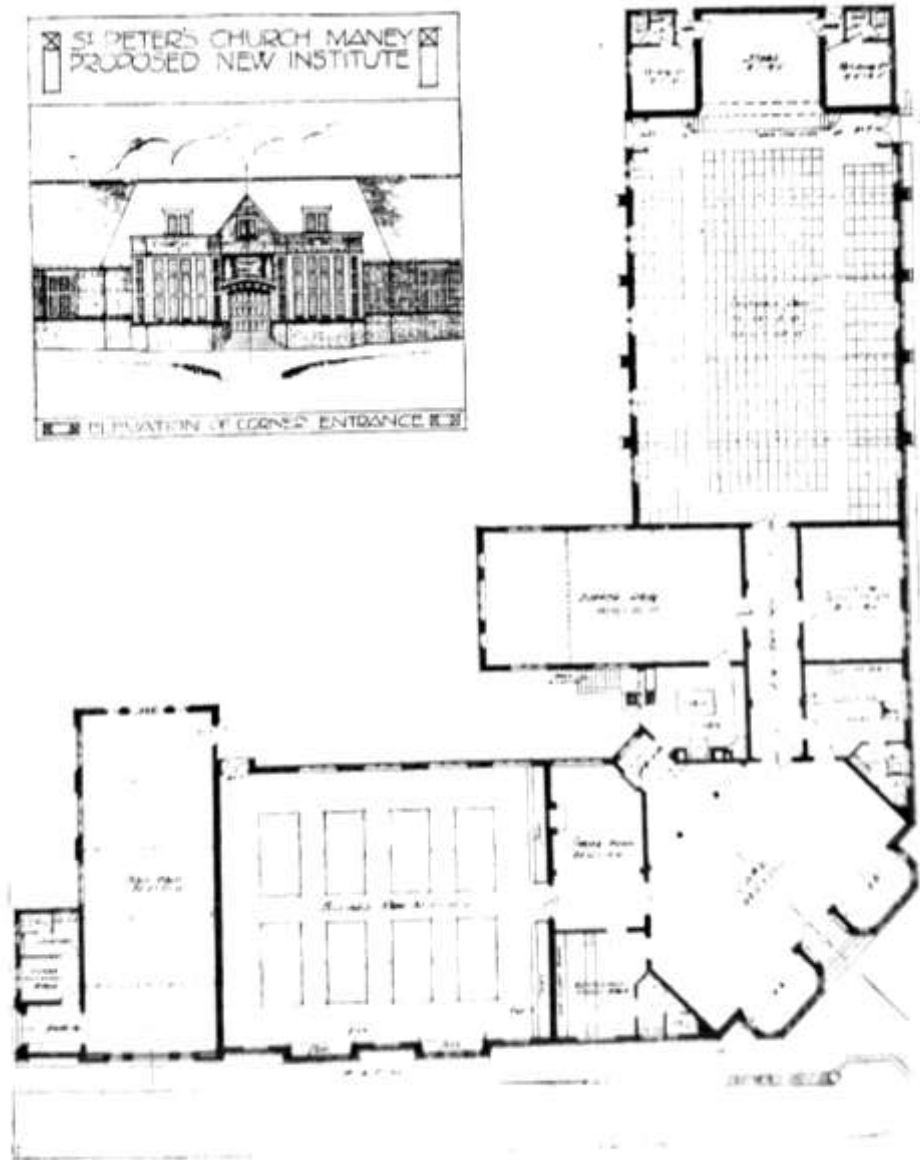

# Notes on some of the Sketches of Old Sutton

By Mr. G. Sidwell.

---

**Ye Olde Stone House** is on the property bought by St. Peter's, Maney, for the New Scheme. It is one of the fifty houses built by Bishop Vesey, and dates back to the years 1528-1536. It has a spiral stone staircase, at the top of which is a watchman's stone seat with the opening through which light was shown to guide a friend, or an arrow was thrown to goad an enemy. It has been well restored recently and is a treasure well worth preserving, both for its utility and its antiquarian interest. In their early days the rental of these houses was 2/- per annum!

**The Old Grammar School**, formerly known as St. Mary's Hall, stood in the Blind Lane and served its purpose as a school for 200 years (1527-1728). It was pulled down in 1832, when the Churchyard was enlarged. The educational foundation originated with John Gibons, Clerk, and 20 others who granted to Bishop Vesey, all their possessions in Great Sutton, Ashfurlong, Maneyhill and Wigginhill, to the intent that he might grant them a yearly rent of £7 to support for ever a priest to celebrate Divine Service in the Parish Church of Sutton, or an honest layman to teach grammar and rhetoric in the town.

Our Artist (Mr. Stanley Griffiths), to whom we owe a debt of gratitude, has, in this case, used for his purpose, a water-colour drawing by the late Mr. W. F. Woodington, A.R.A., who was born at the Three Tuns in 1806.

**Cocksparrow Hall** originally stood opposite "The Rookery," and was pulled down in "the seventies." Its curious name is probably due to a small building at its rear which consisted of two rooms only (one up and one down), the upper one being reached by the aid of a ladder.

## Notes on some of the Sketches of Old Sutton—*continued.*

By Mr. G. Sidwell.

**The Kirk Cots** gives a fair representation of the old half-timbered buildings that stand at the bottom of Church Road, opposite Maney Hill Road. They are now modernised considerably, but not beyond recognition.

**Cromwell House** is a name given to the Manor House by Mr. W. F. Woodington, the artist before-mentioned, who had heard in his boyhood days some legendary history concerning it. The sketch is that of a corner of the old building on "the Manor Hill," overlooking Manor Road.

**The Boat House, Wyndley**, is neither very old nor historic, but is interesting. It is known that there were tenants at "Wyndley" in 1309, who had to grind their corn at the Earl of Warwick's windmill at Maney. The edifice sketched is, of course, of a much later date than the windmill.

**Ye Old Pie Shop** stood at the corner of Manor Road, and is well remembered by many alive to-day. Till "the eighties" it was not a Pie Shop, but a fine old Elizabethan house inhabited by Old Sutton families, one, of the name of Peat, lived there for several generations, and the bridge crossing the brook at Maney, and erected in 1827, was named after that family. Subsequently, the house was occupied by Mr. Wm. Hayward and his son Thomas, who moved to the Manor House in 1862.

**Yew Tree House** was a fine old half-timbered house facing the dam and was in existence until some 25 years ago. Its occupiers in 1668 must have witnessed "The Great Flood" of that year. The roots of the adjoining Yew Tree had so undermined the premises as to render their restoration impossible. Both the house and the tree would have disappeared much earlier but for the intercession of a Sutton lady.
